Flying is fun. Getting to fly an airplane you've built yourself has got to be even better! I hope to have that experience some day. I enjoyed speaking at a recent EAA meeting. Thanks to all for such a warm response.

As both a flight instructor and the Chief at Take Flight Alaska, I hope to get you excited and to motivate you to keep your flying skills sharp, to continue your pilot training, and maybe to even get your flying companion involved with some hands-on flight training.

As many of you have already been told and may have read, one of the best things you can do to become a better pilot is to get an instrument rating (if you don't already have one). I've often been told that the reduction in aviation insurance premiums for an instrument-rated pilot, over the course of a couple of years, will often more than pay for the training. Even if you elect for only liability coverage, or for no insurance at all, the numbers should speak for themselves.

Have you considered getting formal mountain-flying

training? Our flight school offers a structured mountain checkout which includes watching a video on mountain flying, completing a written test, and flying in mountainous terrain.

Take Flight Alaska also offers instruction to non-pilot flying companions, which prepares them should the pilot become incapacitated. The course utilizes AOPA's Pinch-Hitter video and training syllabus to enable a flying companion to effectively communicate with ATC and to successfully land an aircraft.

Additionally, Take Flight Alaska's full-service maintenance facility does offer owner-assisted annual inspections on all aircraft, including experimental certified aircraft.

It is often said a pilot's license is a license to learn. Keeping an open mind to getting additional instruction from an FAA-certified flight instructor is a good policy for keeping it safe!






TECHNICAL COUNSELC .: PROJECT VISIT by Cliff Belleau



He has had to learn to TIG weld to do the project. He had welded with stick and oxy-acetylene before. He described the process of learning as not too difficult once he realized that the two were related in their technique.
