One major point he emphasized was this, As of February 1, 2009, the international COSPAS-SARSAT satellite system will discontinue satellite-based monitoring of the 121.5/243-MHz frequencies in favor of the more advanced 406MHz.

There is no FAA requirement to upgrade to the new ELTs. Sal didn't come out and say this but, with all the remote flying we do here in Alaska, the smart money is on one of these new units. Hopefully, prices will come down as demand increases.

Elsewhere in this newsletter Rob will talk about Gary Bennett and Chuck May. We are

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Chuck May and his RV-7

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"I helped a friend with a biplane project but after he got it done and saw some of the difficulties he had, I changed my mind," said May.

The motivation to build the RV-7 is not too different than other builder's stories.

"When I looked at the price of a 40 year-old Cessna 182, I decided it would be cheaper to build my own airplane, and have something that is new and fun to fly," May said.

To date May has logged 1,098 hours working on his kit plane since he first received it in 2002. While May took two years off, due to health related problems he says that he does something on it everyday that he can.

"I usually work on it from two to six hours a day, but I average at least 15 hours a week," he said. May has fitted an O-320 160 horsepower engine on the airframe that will use a fixed pitch propeller. The two-place aircraft will use the tricycle gear configuration, and the aircraft will have a Garmin GPS but will use steam gauges, instead of the glass type instrument panels that are becoming more popular.

The aircraft once finished, will

be moved and hangared at Birchwood Airport in Chugiak.

As the project of aluminum, fiberglass and now Plexiglas takes shape in the May's garage you can see an end is near with his project, that is, if he gets some help with the canopy.

"This is the best kit on the market, and while it is a l-i-t-t-l-e bit more complicated than I originally thought, but I am pleased with the way things are going," May said.

Northen Lights Avionic's Bennett talks about technology upgrades

Gary Bennett took time out of his busy schedule to give a seminar to Chapter 42 early in May. Bennett talked about the new Garmin 495 and about the 406 MHz ELTs as well as filling in a few gaps in information about ADS-B and the new State funded equipage program. Bennett stated that his shop is so busy with avionics upgrade isntallations that he is booked a year in advance. So plan ahead, if you need help Bennett and his crew are planning a big 30 year anniversary this month. Go see them at Garmin week on June 23-28.
